To gain hands on experience in a planning organization so that students become future ready after they obtained the postgraduate degree. The main objective of professional training is to expose the students to live planning and development project and working environment in a planning agency.

Course Outcomes (COs):

After undertaking professional training, the students would be able:

- To show capabilities of working on live planning and development projects.
- To demonstrate knowledge of work environments in different planning organizations.

Course Contents:

Each student shall undertake training in a planning or related office for 6-8 calendar weeks. Students will undergo professional training in a department approved organization on a project for 6-8 calendar weeks. This will be supervised training by a senior professional from the organization. Satisfactory completion of training will be mandatory for the award of a degree. Two credits will be awarded for successful completion of training.

Report works:

Every student must document his/her contribution during the internship period, and project details, in which he/she was involved. Student has to prepare & submit: a Report and a presentation on it

Note:

Detailed instructions are given by the University regarding the internship, the frequency of reporting to the department, etc. will be issued at the end of the Second Semester, which the student must strictly follow. After completion of internship, every student will have to submit a detailed report with its presentation on which she/he has worked during the 6-8 calendar weeks of the internship period.

Evaluation:

The internal assessment shall be evaluated after the initiation of third semester and shall be conducted by the faculty deputed by the institute. The detailed report and presentation prepared during practical Internship by students will be evaluated at a viva-voce by a jury consisting of one external, one internal and head of the department or his nominee. After submission of the report, the department at its convenience will arrange for the conduct of the viva-voce examination.

Students are required to submit reports after the completion of internship supported by an • intermediate weekly log. The performance of the student in the viva- voce examination will be conducted by a panel of internal and external examiners.

Assessment

- The qualitative assessment grading done by the office in the 'Evaluation Sheet of Trainee' would be quantified for an assessment of 50 marks of internal assessment.
- The Final report compiled during the entire internship period would account for internal assessment and would be required to be submitted one week prior to the conduct of End Semester viva-voce Examination. Also, final log sheet and confidential internship report to be submitted at the same time. This will be considered as Continuous progression evaluation.

Type of Office /Organization

While choosing office for internship, students shall keep the note of following:

- 1. Suggested list of organizations may include Government Institutes/Institutions, State Town and Country Planning Boards, Urban Development Authorities, State Housing Boards, Municipalities, Municipal Council and Municipal Corporation, Smart city related to planning department.
- 2. In case of 'Partnership'/'Private Limited firms, at least one of the partner/ directors shall be a Planner, the firm shall have at least one planners as Partner/director/employee/ associate.
- 3. In case of a 'Public-sector'/State or Central Government office/academic institute or a multi- national organization, there shall be a separate wing for planning consultancy works.

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
