Course Content:

Unit I: Early Political History of Madhya Pradesh

Ancient political history of Madhya Pradesh, Early settlements and the rule of Mahajanapadas (Avanti and Chedi). Mauryan and Gupta administrations in the region (governance structures and policies), The impact of trade routes, urbanization, and regional politics on state formation.

Unit II: Medieval Political Landscape of Madhya Pradesh

Political developments during the Rajput, Parmar, and Chandela rule (administration, warfare, and diplomacy). The impact of Delhi Sultanate and Mughal rule on Madhya Pradesh, (Provincial administration, taxation, and land revenue policies). Regional chieftains resisting Mughal expansion.

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Unit III: Marathas and British Rule in Madhya Pradesh

Rise of the Marathas and their influence on the political framework of Madhya Pradesh (Role of Holkars, Scindias, and Bhonsles). British intervention, the annexation policies, and the impact of the 1857 Revolt. Administrative changes introduced by the British (Revenue settlements and Legal systems).

Unit IV: Freedom Struggle and Political Movements in Madhya Pradesh

Role of Madhya Pradesh in the Indian freedom movement (Highlighting tribal revolts, peasant uprisings, and the contribution of national leaders from the region). The impact of the Non-Cooperation Movement, Civil Disobedience Movement, and Quit India Movement on local politics. Analyzes the formation of Madhya Bharat, Vindhya Pradesh, and Bhopal states before their integration into Madhya Pradesh.

Unit V: Post-Independence Politics and Governance

Reorganization of Madhya Pradesh in 1956 and its political development in the post-independence era. Role of major political parties, chief ministers, governance policies, and socio-economic transformations. Impact of regional movements, tribal politics, and recent political trends in the state's development.

Historiography as a discipline and its development in India, Major historiographical traditions in Madhya Pradesh, Colonial, nationalist, Marxist, and subaltern approaches, Sources for the history of Madhya Pradesh – literary, epigraphic, numismatic, and archival sources.

Unit II: Archaeology and Prehistory of Madhya Pradesh

Definition, scope, and methods of archaeology; Prehistoric cultures of Madhya Pradesh – Paleolithic, Mesolithic, Neolithic, and Chalcolithic phases; Important prehistoric sites – Bhimbetka, Adamgarh, and others; Rock art and its significance.

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Unit III: Protohistoric and Early Historic Archaeology

Unit IV: Classical and Medieval Archaeology

Gupta and post-Gupta period sites in Madhya Pradesh; Temples and sculptures of the Pratihara, Paramara, and Chandela dynasties; Forts and Medieval urban centers; Archaeological importance of sites like Gyaraspur, Khajuraho, and Mandu.

Unit V: Archaeology in the Modern Period

Role of archaeology in preserving cultural heritage; Contributions of the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) and state archaeology departments, Conservation of historical monuments, Recent excavations and their findings in Madhya Pradesh.
