- To develop basic skills in reading and understanding historical maps.
- To compare ancient political and cultural zones with today's India.

#### **Syllabus**

#### Unit I: Introduction to Historical Geography and Map Skills

Concept of Historical Geography, Importance of Maps in History, Basic Map-Reading Skills (directions, scale, symbols), Physical Features of India: Rivers, Mountains, Plateaus.

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### **Unit II: Mapping Ancient Indian Empires**

Mauryan Empire: Extent and Capitals, Gupta Empire and Cultural Centres, Major Ancient Trade Routes, Important Ancient Cities and River Systems.

#### **Unit III: Mapping Medieval India**

Delhi Sultanate and Mughal Empire: Boundaries and Capitals, Provincial Divisions and Major Forts, Trade Routes and Important Ports, Pilgrimage Routes and Religious Centres.

#### Unit IV: Historical vs. Modern Geography

Historical Regions and Modern States, Comparison of Ancient Zones with Present-Day Borders, Ancient Names of Regions (Bhāratavarṣa, Jambudvīpa, Āryāvarta, Tianzhu, Nābhivarṣa, Dakshinapatha, etc.), Continuity and Change in Urban and Cultural Centres.
